New Boating Regulations



NEW BOATING REGULATIONS

New Move Over Law – Effective January 1, 2023

Every motorboat, when approaching or passing within 200 feet of any law enforcement vessel or emergency services vessel that is displaying flashing blue or red lights, shall slow to no-wake speed so that the effect of the wake does not disturb the activities of the law enforcement or emergency services personnel. Where the operator of a motorboat fails to comply with this regulation, and where such failure endangers the life or limb of any person involved or endangers or damages the vessels involved, the operator shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be additionally required to complete and pass a NASBLA-approved safe boating course.

Fire Extinguishers Age - Effective April 20. 2022

If your disposable (non-rechargeable) fire extinguisher has the Underwriters Laboratories Inc. (UL) Trademark, a date of manufacture stamped on the bottle, and it is older than 12 years since the date, the extinguisher is considered expired and must be removed from service. Look for wording on the bottle stating, "This product must be removed from service within 12 years after date of manufacturing".

Engine Cut-Off Switch (ECOS) - April 1, 2021

An Engine Cut-Off Switch (ECOS) prevents runaway vessels and the threats they pose. The ECOS usually consists of a lanyard attached to the operator and to a switch that shuts off the engine if the operator is displaced from the helm. Wireless ECOS which shut down the engine when the operator hits the water are permitted.

Recreational boats less than 26 feet in length manufactured after December 2019 and capable of 3 HP are required to be equipped with ECOS. Owners are required to maintain the ECOS system. This system will be used when the primary helm is not enclosed and the boat is operating above displacement speed. ECOS use would not be required when docking/trailering, trolling and operating in no-wake zones.

Commander's Message










Join Richmond Sail and Power Squadron's First Annual June Jubilee Poker Run!

Marine Navigation Course This is the new USPS navigation course that replaces the former Piloting Course. **Jim Zeigler** reported that the class is winding down and exams will be ordered around the second week of June. The class has eight students attending.

Trailering Your Boat Jim Juritsch and Dave Childress presented a seminar on how to safely and securely trailer your boat and how to maintain and use your boat trailer. It was held Sunday, May 21st at 10:00 AM to 12:00 PM and 2:00 PM to 4:00 PM at the Osborne Landing parking lot. Even though participation was less than desired, it did develop into an opportunity for several Vessel Safety Checks to be completed. Jim Juritsch and Jim Zeigler, who are VSC Examiners, each completed several checks during the afternoon.

Boat Operator Certification (BOC)

Have you ever considered participating in the BOC program and receiving a boat operator's certification?

What is the BOC? This is a member's only program which is offered in four successive levels. They are Inland Navigator, Coastal Navigator, Advanced Coastal Navigator and Offshore Navigator. Progressive completion of each level certifies the (more—>)

ability of the member to operate in increasingly challenging waters, on longer voyages and farther offshore. Each level requires the completion of certain courses and seminars as well as an on-the water skill demonstration with a specially trained certifier. The courses and seminars are in the standard USPS curriculum and you may have already completed several of these already.

Why would I want a BOC certification in my type of Boat? Well, how proficient and knowledgeable do you want to be while out on the water with family and friends? A certification program will give you the tools and skills to become a proficient boat captain well above the level of the average recreational boater. It represents the fulfillment of a USPS training program where you become an operator who is knowledgeable, competent and safe. In addition, the certification contributes to your boating resume when chartering power or sailing vessels in the United States and near foreign waters. Depending on your boat insurance company, you may also qualify for discounts on your rates when renewing your boat policy.



LOCAL NOTICE TO MARINERS

GWYNN'S ISLAND BRIDGE - Openings restricted to 2 a.m., 5 a.m., 8 a.m., 11 a.m., 7 p.m. and 10 p.m. through October 12, 2023. The vertical clearance of the drawbridge in the closed-to-navigation position is 12 feet above mean high water.

<u>PIANKATANK RIVER</u> – Until August 5, 2023, oyster reef rehabilitation project at the mouth of the Piankatank River.

<u>NEW RAPPAHANNOCK RIVER</u> - Oyster Reef Construction in Rappahannock River from Windmill Point to above Urbanna

NEW GREAT WICOMICO RIVER - Oyster Reef Construction from entrance to above Sandy Point (beacon "9")

<u>MAJOR CONSTRUCTION CONTINUES</u> - Hampton Roads Bridge Tunnel, Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel and the Route 301 bridge at Dahlgren.

NOAA HYDRIGRAPHIC SURVEY - Survey work continues in the James, York, Rappahannock and Potomac Rivers through 1 July 2023.

NEW BRIDGE PROPOSAL NEAR HENRICUS PARK - Coast Guard 5th District is requesting comments by June 26, 2023 on a proposed new bridge over the James River Oxbow near the south end of the I-295 Varina – Enon bridge. The bridge will connect Henricus Park to the Corporate Village Parkway. New access to Henricus Park is needed because of Dominion Energy's coal-ash landfill exhumation located along the current Henricus Park Road. The project will replace the Dutch Gap Boat Launch. The new fixed bridge over the oxbow (not the river main channel) will have a 160-foot horizontal clearance and 29-foot vertical clearance of 29 feet above mean high water.

In the Morning and Evening Sky

The planets move around the sun at different rates; Venus 225 days, Mars 687 days Jupiter 12 years and Saturn 29 years. In the meantime we are also orbiting the sun every 365.25 days. So the apparent position of the planets relative to the sun is constantly changing and these bright planets move through our sky at different rates.

We had a good demonstration of this in June. Saturn and Jupiter which gave us a spectacular evening show in early winter and now have reemerged in the morning sky. And Venus and Mars, our closet neighbor planets, remain in the evening sky.

Venus will continue as the bright object in the western sky. Reddish Mars will appear close to Venus. They will appear closest on July 1. Venus will be its highest in the evening sky on June 4, then begin to fall.

Bright Saturn will appear high in the eastern predawn sky while Jupiter will start out low in and gradually climb in the predawn eastern sky. The crescent moon will be close to Jupiter in the morning sky on June 14 and close to Venus in the evening sky on June 21 which is also the summer solstice.


Don't forget to look for the gibbous moon one day either side of the new moon on June 18. The edge of the moon will be brightly reflect sunlight while the rest of the moon will be faintly lit by light reflected off the earth (earthshine).



HURRICANE SEASON STARTS JUNE 1

The NOAA Hurricane forecast was released on May 25. NOAA predicts a 40% chance of a normal hurricane season, a 30% chance of a less severe season and a 30% chance of a more severe season. This is in line with earlier predictions from Colorado State University and North Caroline State University (see table). NOAA attributes this forecast to an emerging El Niño condition in the tropical Pacific Ocean. But caution is warranted due to apparent changing climate conditions.
